

STOP Annual Progress Report: Guide to Categories for People Trained (Question #12)

General Hints

- Use the category that is most descriptive of the people attending the training event. **The fit does not have to be perfect**—if the professionals trained are similar to those in the existing category, use that category.
- If the professionals in a group are from different disciplines or types of agencies, and you do not have specific numbers for that group, report them in the “multidisciplinary group” category.
- If you do report more than one response in “other,” include how many people received training for each response you are reporting by placing the number beside the appropriate response in the text box description.

NOTE: The lists below are not intended to be exhaustive, but rather to serve as examples of types of professionals trained and where and how they should be reported. Examples are organized into four groupings in this document:

- III. Inappropriate “other”

III. Inappropriate “others”—do not report, since these are not professionals
